What do SB199 and HB211 do?

They create the Temporary Redistricting Advisory Commission. The commission would work with the professional services vendor hired by the Legislative Council to develop two to five sets of districts maps for: the congressional districts, the Public Education Commission, the New Mexico Senate, and the New Mexico House.

SB199 & HB211state that political subdivisions, contiguity, and compactness are the priorities in redistricting. They also prohibit certain factors from being considered when preparing redistricting plans. Specifically, they provide that districts shall not be drawn to favor any political party, incumbent legislator, member of Congress, or any other person or group, or for the purpose of augmenting or diluting the voting strength of a language or racial minority group.

SB4 Redistricting Precinct Changes

This bill increases the number of precincts based upon the 2020 election turnout and other factors. It also sets calendar day requirements for when certain phases of redistricting will be done rather than set dates. This is important due to the delayed delivery of the federal census data to the states.

SB15 establishes a redistricting committee made up of only legislators. This is the process that has failed so miserably over the last 30 years. That has led to the courts drawing up the maps and an erosion of public trust in the political process.

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
